

Purpose of checklist

Stormwater Swales: The City proposes to create six (6) stormwater swales on City property or in public rights-of-way to provide basic treatment for several existing direct storm water

discharges into Medical Lake. The proposed swale in the S Broad Street right-of way, just south of E Campbell Street (site 5) will include a lift station. Site 6 adds a catch basin to lead stormwater to an existing natural swale.

The existing Coney Island Park discharge will be redirected to another discharge location with a lift station.

For work near the lake, silt fences shall be installed to thwart erosion and containment potential.
